From the Editor

Provember is here and it is a time of thanks. Veterans Day is November 11, and a time to thank our veterans for serving our great country. So when you see a Vet, shake her/ his hand and say "Thanks!"

I would like to thank the people who have helped to get the *Zeitung* to you in 2012. No matter what or how much I write, if it were not for them, the *Zeitung* would not get to your door. First is Rick Groff, who gets the *Zeitung* ready for publishing and off to the printer. It is then picked up, folded, and labeled by Henry and Mary Pfaff, assisted by Anna Bultjer, after which it is taken to the post office.

Thank you to all for their assistance. If it were not for your dedication to getting the paper out, no one would be reading this right now!

Thanksgiving is the time for us to reflect on the many positive things that have happened to us over the past year and to count our blessings. When my husband and I get together with our son and his family for Thanksgiving—before the blessing is said, or one morsel of food is touched—we go around the table and each person, including the children, tell one thing that happened over the past year that they are thankful for. It really puts a positive spin on the day, and makes us all think about our many blessings. We live in a free country, we have a roof over our heads and food to eat, friends and family, and of course, we have our wonderful German American Society. We should give thanks for being able to wake up in the morning to face whatever is in store for us.

Have a wonderful and blessed Thanksgiving, and think about all we have to be thankful for!

Now, to some traditions in Germany:

You may have seen this before, but it is worth repeating. November 11 is Sankt Martinstag. Leading up to this day children can be seen walking in procession carrying candlelit lanterns behind "Sankt Martin" in his Roman uniform riding "Schimmel," a white horse. Children of all ages sing songs that celebrate the life of Martin of Tours. Long before the lanterns go out, the final verse of one of the most popular songs rings through the German streets:

Ich geh' mit meiner Laterne, Und meine Laterne mit mir. Dort oben leuchten die Sterne, Hier unten, da leuchten wir. Mein Licht is aus, Wir geh' nach Haus, Rabimmel, rabimmel, rabum.

The procession often ends at a huge bonfire, with a snack of a St. Martin Weckman, a sweet yeast dough "breadman" with raisin eyes and a clay pipe. There's hot chocolate for the children and heated mulled wine for the "older" children. Afterwards, some of the children will go singing door to door to be rewarded for the originality of their lanterns and the quality of their singing with fruit, nuts, and other treats. (I do have a recipe for the St. Martin Weckman if any one would like it).

You may be wondering who St. Martin was. He was born around 316 A.D., the son of a tribune of the Roman army, which meant that he, too, had to join the Roman army at age fifteen. Legend has it that three years later he was riding through the gates of Amiens during a snowstorm when he saw a starving beggar with little to protect him from the icy temperatures. So St. Martin took his sword and cut his cloak in two and gave half to the beggar.

As he slept that night, St. Martin had a dream in which Christ appeared to him as the beggar, saying to the angels around him, "Here is Martin, the Roman soldier who is not baptized. He has clothed me." Not long after the dream, Martin decided that a life of fighting and killing was not for him and he later became a baptized Christian and a successful missionary. A much loved and exemplary man who until his death in November 397 led a simple, compassionate life, despite being made the Bishop of Tours in Gaul, modern-day France. Unlike those declared a saint before him, Sankt Martin was not a martyr, and over the years he has become the patron saint of, amongst others, France, beggars, soldiers, innkeepers, alcoholics, wine growers, tailors, equestrians and pet animals, including geese. In fact, eating a goose is a traditional meal on this November 11 holiday.

Now, a little about *Erntedankfest:* Thanksgiving in German Europe has a long tradition, but one that is different in many ways from that in North America. First of all, the Germanic *Erntedankfest* ("harvest festival of thanks") is primarily a rural and a religious celebration. When it is celebrated in larger cities, it is usually part of a church service and not anything like the big traditional family holiday in North America. Although it is celebrated locally and regionally, none of the German-speaking countries observes an official national Thanksgiving holiday on a particular day as in the United States. However, during harvest time, visitors to German churches will find a plethora
