From The Editor

Christmas song goes. The Christmas shows on TV and carols on the radio started even before Thanksgiving was here. Black Friday (and now Black Thursday, too!) has passed and we are now all up to our elbows in thinking about what to do, what to buy, where to go, what to prepare for Christmas dinner, what cookies to bake, and all the other stressors that we feel this time of year. But it is also a great time of year; we get together with friends we may not see often; spend time with our families creating new memories and discussing Christmases that have passed and the people who were there; sharing laughs and sometimes shedding a few tears for those

we miss. We have cards to write and send either by snail or e-mail or on Facebook, and all the other new means of communication, to let people know we're thinking about them and wish them holiday greetings.

This is also a time of year to reflect on what Christmas really means and why we celebrate. There has been some discussion about the origin of the Christmas tree, so I thought I would repeat the following article. According to an article written by William Rauscher, many people believe that the origin of the Christmas tree actually had its roots in pagan rites, along with the use of other greens and decorations to commemorate in ancient times a celebration of the feast of Saturnalia—the birth of the sun in the sky at the winter solstice. Along with the giving of gifts, the feast was later Christianized with the selection of December 25 to announce the birth of the Son of God.

However, the Christmas tree as we know it comes to us from Germany. The story goes that Martin Luther was walking home one night and was inspired by the beauty of the stars shining down on the snow-covered fir trees. He told his family about the feelings he experienced that night by bringing a fir tree into his home. He attached lighted candles to the branches to symbolize the stars shining down from heaven. Over the years, decorations were added, sometimes using fruit and nuts, and of course, the Christmas pickle. Today, all kinds of ornaments and lights are used to decorate the tree. When you light that tree, remember the true meaning as Martin Luther experienced it centuries ago.

Another Christmas custom is that of honoring a family's Christmas tree, or *Christbaumloben*. This day is a lot of fun for the adults. On St. Stephen's Day, December 26, friends visit each other and announce upon arrival, "Ein schöner Baum!"
