From the Editor

irst I want to thank **Nancy Crast** for the outstanding job she did in mailing out the *Zeitung*. She took us into the "computer age" with the new way that the mailings are done for the postal service. She was very conscientious and timely in everything she did, and for that I am more than grateful. I wish you only the best in the future.

Now on to the Christmas season. "It's the most wonderful time

of the year," as a famous Christmas song says. The Christmas shows on TV and carols on the radio started even before Thanksgiving was here. Black Friday has passed and we are all now up to our elbows in thinking about what to do, what to buy, where to go, what to prepare for Christmas dinner, and all the other stressors that we feel this time of year. But it is also a great time of year; we get together with friends we may not see often, spend time with our families creating new memories and discussing Christmases that have passed and the people who were there, sharing laughs and sometimes shedding a few tears for those we miss. We have cards to write and send either by snail or e-mail or now on social media, to let people know we're thinking about them and wish them holiday greetings.

This is also a time of year to reflect on what Christmas really means and why we celebrate. Sometimes it feels like the real reason for the season is lost. So, as we prepare to celebrate, let's take a minute or two to reflect on what this event that we prepare for weeks ahead of time means, and what we are really celebrating.

Whatever your beliefs or background, take the time to celebrate with family and friends, and start by attending the German American **Christmas Party** on December 4 from 2 to 6 P.M. being held at the Syracuse Turners.

In thinking about what German Christmas tradition to write about, I happened upon the Advent calendar. Having been brought up in a German Lutheran household, I took the Advent calendar for granted and never really thought about its origin. I know what it stands for, the counting down of the days in Advent until the birth of Jesus, but where did it come from? So, I looked into this a little deeper. At least as early as the beginning of the 19th century, German Lutherans would count down the twenty-four days of Advent, which often meant putting a chalk line on the door each day, beginning on December 1. Other families lit a candle or hung a little religious picture on the wall each day. The candles were sometimes placed on an Advent clock.

It is believed that the first known Advent calendar was homemade in 1851. History notes that the first printed Advent calendar was produced in Hamburg in 1902 or 1903; other authorities state that a Swabian parishioner, Gerhard Lang, was responsible for the first printed calendar in 1908. Lang was a printer in the firm Reichhold & Lang of Munich, who, in 1908, made 24 little colored pictures that could be affixed to a piece of cardboard. Several years later it was changed to 24 little doors. There were at least 30 different designs before they went out of business in the 1930s. At around that time another printing company, Sankt Johannes, started producing religious Advent calendars with Bible verses instead of pictures. The practice disappeared during World War II, apparently to save paper. After the war, Richard Sellmer of Stuttgart resurrected the commercial calendar and is responsible for its widespread popularity.

Many Advent calendars today consist of two layers of cardboard with the top layer having 24 doors cut and ready to be opened, one for each day, by the children. Most of the time there is a piece of chocolate behind the door, which when removed may have a feature of the Nativity story and the birth of Jesus or something else to do with Christmas like bells or holly. Sometimes the Advent calendars



are even made of a sheet with 24 pockets. Each pocket holds some kind of a treat or little gift. There is a giant calendar in the city of Dresden that is built into a fairytale castle on its Christmas market, the Striezelmarkt.

The Advent calendar has sure changed from its humble beginnings of chalk marks on a door. However, the meaning is still there for what each day is leading up to.

Another custom is that of honoring a family's Christmas tree, or *Christbaumloben*. This is the day that is a lot of fun for the adults. On St. Stephen's Day, December 26, friends visit each other and announce upon arrival, *Ein schöner Baum!* Their reward for praising the tree is (yes,



you guessed it) a bit of alcohol. After they stay and chat for a while, they move on to the next house and the procession goes on and on . . . Sounds like a typical German celebration to me!!!

So be prepared, get out the *Schnapps*, bring out the *Stollen*, and enjoy the season from the start of Advent to St. Stephen's Day. Fröhliche Weinachten!
