From the Editor

Oktoberfest was a real blast! Everyone seemed to be having a great time. As noted in the various articles above, there are many individuals being thanked for their part in Oktoberfest. However, in my opinion, a huge thank-you needs to go out to **Klaus Raith** for another tremendous job in ensuring that the Oktoberfest provides the avenue for our German heritage and culture to be preserved and observed by all. On behalf of everyone, **Thank You, Klaus! Great job!**

As I promised last month, here are ten things that you probably didn't know about Oktoberfest. This information was submitted by our member **Richard Pfaff** from information posted on the Internet by Amanda Marsteller, who wrote this for anyone planning to attend the Oktoberfest in Munich. Below is a summary of that information:

- Oktoberfest has been raging for over 200 years. The first Oktoberfest took place in 1810 to honor the wedding of Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig's wedding to Princess Theresa of Sazony-Hildburghausen.
- It should really be called Septemberfest since the sixteen-day affair in Munich starts in September.
- The party doesn't start until the mayor taps in.

- Only authentic German beers are served at Oktoberfest. The breweries supplying the beer are Hofbräuhaus München, Spaten-Franziskaner-Bräu, Paulener Bräu, Löwenbräu, Hacker-Pschorr Bräu and Augustiner Bräu. The alcohol content of the Oktoberfest beers clocks in at about 6% ABV. Festival-goers have been known to faint from the combination of warm weather and alcohol, earning the nickname *Bierleichen* or “beer corpses.”
- There’s more to Oktoberfest than beer. Belly up for some seriously hearty eats. These include 500,000 roast chickens, 120,000 pairs of sausages, 50,000 pork knuckles and an unfathomable number of head-sized soft pretzels. There are also massive piles of potato dumplings and potato pancakes, sauerkraut and apple strudel. After all that indulgence, save room for a giant gingerbread heart souvenir decorated with endearing phrases and worn as an edible necklace.
- Trying to run off with an official Oktoberfest stein? Thousands before you have tried and failed. Security guards are stationed near tent entrances to keep steins from sneaking off. You’ll definitely get caught and slapped with a hefty fine if you try. In 2008, a Bavarian waitress balanced 19 full beer steins (each weighing about 5 pounds) and walked across the tent without spilling a drop.
- Feeling invincible? If you feel you need to stretch out your legs, beware of placing your foot on the table. That’s the universal sign for preparing to down an entire Stein of beer in one go. If you succeed, prepare to be fully drunk in seconds. If you fail, an audience of thousands will show you no sympathy, and a symphony of boos.
- Get ready to sing your heart out. There will be brass bands playing Herman Oompah songs and American hits. “*Ein Prosit*” is the number one Oktoberfest standard that encourages interactive drinking and toasts, but your ears will perk right up when you hear the melodies of “Sweet Home Alabama,” “YMCA,” Sweet Caroline,” and “Take Me Home, Country Roads.
- Beer, pretzels and a . . . crossbow competition? Visitors can wander about the annual Fun Fair, which includes a 164-foot-high ferris wheel, the famous Olympia Looping Rollercoaster and log flumes, as well as a flea circus and roving street performers. Craving a little more action? Head to the Armbrustschützenzelt tent that has hosted a crossbow competition inside since 1895.
- Can’t make it to Munich? Check out a fest near you. They are found all over the world. The biggest Oktoberfest outside of Germany? Canada claims that honor with its Kitchener-Waterloo festival that’s been running since 1969. Attracting nearly one million visitors each year, this fest follows many of Munich’s customs. Not to be outdone, the largest Oktoberfest in the U.S. is hosted in Cincinnati. Zinzinnati lasts only three days, but closes down six blocks of the city with an opening parade, beer stein race and the “Running of the Wieners”: a dog race that features dachshunds dressed as hot dogs.

Since this is return to school time, just a reminder about the German and Austrian tradition of the Schultüte or School Cone, or as it is called in some parts of Germany, a Zuckertüte or sugar bag. This is a paper bag in the form of a big cone. When the children in Germany and Austria set out for their first day in school upon entering the first grade (kindergarten is considered like our pre-school) their parents and/or grandparents present them with a big decorated cardboard cone filled with toys, chocolates, candies, school supplies, and various other goodies. Sometimes there are even CDs, books, and even articles of clothing. The children are excited to get the cones, and it makes the first day of school very special for them. This tradition has reportedly been going on since the nineteenth century. There are advertisers in *German Life* magazine that offer these cones for sale. What a surprise for our own little ones!
