#### From the Editor

This month I would like to highlight an article submitted by member **Jim Heckathorne**.

#### **Bier in Deutschland!**

When Americans think about Germany they often think about beer—and rightly so, as Germany ranks 4th in the world in per capita consumption (the USA is 21st). In Germany you can drink beer at age 16, or even at age 14 if accompanied by a parent or guardian! At our recent Oktoberfest in Minoa, we served over 3,000 glasses of beer, most of it brewed in Germany, and most of it to people who knew very little about German beer. For those wanting to know a bit more, here's a mini-guide to common German beer styles:

Pilsner (or Pils): The most popular type of beer in Germany, Pils is most common in the east, north, and west, meaning outside of Bavaria. Mainstream American lagers (Budweiser, Miller, Coors) are pilsners, although in Germany they are brewed according to the Reinheitsgebot (purity decree), which forbids the use of adjuncts like corn and rice which sadly dilute the flavor profile of the American versions.

Weißbier (or Weizenbier): These are "white" ales brewed with a high proportion of wheat (Weizen) alongside the standard barley, and are very commonly served throughout Bavaria and Austria in distinctive tall, bulbous glasses. Hefeweizen (hefe means "yeast") is an unfiltered wheat beer which is characterized by its cloudiness and creamy head—the Franziskaner we served at our Oktoberfest was a Hefeweizen. A good Hefeweizen will have slight notes of clove or banana flavors which are byproducts of the special yeast used in brewing—no clove or banana is actually added to the beer!

Hell and Dunkel: The German words for "light" and "dark," respectively, Hell and Dunkel are styles of lager very popular around Munich—at the famous Hofbräuhaus in Munich you would most likely be served a Hellesbier, unless you asked for a Dunkel. The

Spaten Premium Lager that we served at our Oktoberfest was a *Hell* brewed in Munich.

Märzen: As shown by its name, Märzenbier was traditionally brewed in Bavaria in the month of March (the last month cold enough for lager brewing), stored in caves or cellars over the summer, and served in the fall. Today, this malty, lightly hopped, amber lager is the signature beer of the Munich Oktoberfest. In fact, "Oktoberfest" beer popular in the United States is actually a Märzen style, and the Spaten Oktoberfest beer that we served at our own recent fest was in reality a Märzen brewed in Munich.

Kölsch: This is a very light-bodied ale which, by German law, can only be brewed in the city of Köln (Cologne in English). In a traditional Cologne pub, Kölsch is served by a Köbes (beer waiter) who hustles around with trays of the small narrow glasses, dropping one off in front of every patron whether they ordered it or not; if you are done drinking, you must place your beer mat over your glass to signal to the Köbes that you've had enough! In Syracuse, if you ever ordered a Skinny Atlas Light beer at the Empire Brewery, you were having a Kölsch-style ale, and not an American "Lite" lager.

Altbier: As with Kölsch, Alt is brewed only in the city of Düsseldorf (which has a fierce rivalry with its northern neighbor, Cologne, that extends to their favored beers—a Düsseldorfer would never be caught dead with a Kölsch, and vice versa). As its name implies, Alt is brewed in the "old" style, meaning that it is an ale that can be fermented at warmer temperatures, as opposed to lagers that became more popular once refrigeration was invented. You would be hard-pressed to find many dark, hoppy Alt beers in an American grocery store.

*Bock:* This dark, bittersweet lager generally has a higher alcohol content than most other German beers (which, contrary to popular belief, are really not stronger mainstream American beers). For more kick, you can order an even stronger *Doppelbock*, which can have an alcohol content of around 8 to 12%, twice that of mainstream beers. German beers whose names end in "-ator" are *Doppelbock*, such as the Spaten Optimator that we have served at our Oktoberfest in past years.

While this was just a quick summary (we haven't even mentioned smooth-sipping *Schwarzbier*, tangy Berliner *Weisse*, or smoky Bamberger *Rauchbier*!), there is much more to know and love about German beers, but the key to enjoying them is just to pick one up and drink it! Search for them in the import beer section of our biggest grocery store (you know which one), or stop


