#### From the Editor

ven though we will not be having our own Oktoberfest in 2021, here is some information about how Oktoberfest originated so many, many years ago.

When Crown Prince Ludwig of Bavaria and the Princess of Saxonia, Theresia, were married in Munich on October 12, 1810, a national holiday was declared and the citizens were invited to the five-day wedding festivities celebrated in the fields outside the city's gates. The celebration was so popular that it became an annual festival in Munich with beer stands set up for town folks to quench their thirst. The original beer stands gave way to large beer tents in 1896, and are still part of this elaborate and festive German celebration. Fourteen big tents each accommodate thousands of people seated at picnic tables inside and thousands more outside the tents.

Germany is famous for its beers and its beer-brewing purity laws. There are six breweries highlighted at Munich's Oktoberfest tents. Many revelers arrive at the beer tents in the morning to secure seats for the fun-filled days of drinking, singing, dancing, and eating.

Since the start of Oktoberfest, the dates have been changed from the original wedding date in mid-October to September to have more favorable weather to celebrate the two-week-long festival. In Munich, Oktoberfest usually starts on the third Saturday in September, with the tapping of the first keg of beer by the mayor of the city to officially open the festivities. However, in America, the dates of Oktoberfest make up a wide spectrum from summer months through October.

Oktoberfest is not just the celebration of the famous wedding, it is a spirit and wonderful feeling between old friends, new friends, and family. Strangers become friends when the drinking, music, and dancing start. It is a warm, wonderful feeling that words cannot describe. It gives true meaning to the word *Gemütligkeit!* 

Let's also take a look at another fun time: Halloween. As we celebrate it commonly today, it is not originally German. Yet many Germans now embrace it. Others, especially those of the older generation, believe that Halloween is just American hype, but it has gained much popularity in Germany over the past few decades. In fact, this celebration now brings in an astounding 200 million euros a year, according to the *Stuttgarter Zeitung*, and it is the third most commercialized tradition after Christmas and Easter.

The evidence is all there. Walk into some of the larger German department stores and you'll easily find Halloween-themed decorations to match your gruesome tastes. Or go to a costumed Halloween party offered by many nightclubs.

So how did Germans get so excited about Halloween? Naturally, the influence of American commercialism and media is key. Furthermore, the presence of American soldiers in the post-war WWII era helped bring about a familiarity with this tradition. Also, because of the cancelation of *Fasching* in Germany during the Gulf War, the push for Halloween and its associated commercial potential was an attempt to make up for *Fasching*'s financial loss, according to the *Fachgruppe Karneval im Deutschen Verband der Spielwarenindustrie*.

Trick-or-treating is the aspect of Halloween that is the least observed in Germany. Only in large, metropolitan cities of Ger-

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many will you see groups of children actually going door to door. The children say either *Süßes oder Saures!* or *Süßes, sonst gibt's Saure!* (Trick or treat!) as they collect treats from their neighbors. This is partly because just eleven days later, children traditionally go door-to-door on *St. Martinstag* with their lanterns. They sing a song and then are rewarded with baked goods and sweets.

Halloween specialty stores are increasingly popular in Germany. One interesting difference between Germany and North America with regard to costumes is that the Germans tend to indulge in more scary outfits than Americans do. Even kids. Perhaps this is due to the many other opportunities throughout the year that children and adults get to dress up for different celebrations, such as *Fasching* and *St. Martinstag* that are just around the corner.

October is also the time for other spooky happenings in Germany.

**Haunted Castle:** One of the largest and most popular Halloween venues in Germany is the thousand-year-old fortress ruins in Darmstadt. Since the 1970s, it has been known as *Burg Frankenstein*, and is a popular destination for gore aficionados.

**Pumpkin Festival:** By mid-October you'll see some carvedout pumpkins on people's doorsteps in the streets of Germany and Austria, though not as much as in North America. But what you will see and hear about is the famous pumpkin festival in Retz, Austria, near Vienna. It's an entire weekend of fun, familyfriendly entertainment, complete with an elaborate Halloween parade that includes floats.

**Reformationstag:** This a special day for Protestants to commemorate Martin Luther's launch of the Reformation when he nailed those ninety-five theses to the Catholic castle church in Wittenberg, Germany. In celebration of *Reformationstag*, and so that it's not completely overshadowed by Halloween, *Luther-Bonbons* (Luther candies) were created.
