#### From the Editor

Ithough Ground Hog Day has already passed, I thought it would be interesting to give some information on how this "Celebration" originated.

Many historians say that Groundhog Day (*Grundsau Dak*, *Grundsow Dawg*, *or Murmeltiertag* in *Pennsilfaanisch Deitsch*, or Pennsylvania German) has its origin in Germansettled areas of Pennsylvania, and the animal chosen was the groundhog as there were plenty of this animal available.

According to information I have read on the Internet, a diary entry from 1841 (predating the Punxsutawney tradition) by a storekeeper in Morgantown is one of the earliest records of groundhog weather prediction. The **Historical Society of Berks County** in Reading, has preserved a handwritten note that reads, "Last Tuesday, the 2nd, was Candlemas Day, the day on which, according to the Germans, the Groundhog peeps out of his winter quarters and if he sees his shadow he pops back for another six weeks' nap, but if the day be cloudy he remains out, as the weather is to be moderate."

Groundhog Day has been celebrated in Punxsutawney since 1887 and has grown into a huge celebration. In the movie *Groundhog Day*, there are scenes of the crowd that gathers for this momentous occasion. It looks like so much fun and one big party. There is even a Punxsutawney Groundhog Club that was established in 1887! Every year they choose a Groundhog King and Queen. It is a presiding official of the club who awakens Punxsutawney Phil to get his prediction.

On February 2, 2022, admirers and partygoers from the U.S. and around the world gathered at Gobbler's Knob as Punxsutawney Phil came out of his tree stump at dawn. The suspense became intense as the crowd shouted "six more

weeks!" Everyone wanted to know if he saw his shadow. The Groundhog again predicted another six weeks of winter as he has about 100 times before. If you want to learn more about this celebration, just go online. I got so wrapped up in everything I was reading I lost track of time.

It's almost Valentine's Day, so let's get a look at how Germans celebrate it. *Valentinstag* has only been celebrated in Germany since World War II. In Germany it is an adults-only holiday, so you won't see any of those cute little pink or red "Be Mine" cards that the American children exchange in school. The German cards are strictly meant for adults, and the chocolates that accompany them can be quite provocative.

The Germans also put a little twist to Valentine's Day by adding a pig on their cards. These little pigs are a symbol of luck but also lust. So, for extra luck with the loved one or would-be Valentine, some cards have little pigs holding a four-leaf clover while climbing a ladder to a heart.

Another important item of Valentine's Day in Germany is the big ginger cookies, made in the shape of a heart and decorated with frosting. They usually have a few words written on them such as: *meine Schatzi, Ich liebe dich*, etc.

So, whatever your intent, I hope that Valentine's Day is romantic and filled with love as you express your feelings to your loved one.
