From the Editor

ince America celebrates its independence on July 4 each year, I thought this would be an ideal time to once again write about a German who helped gain that independence and about his many other contributions to the military.

When you think of a German who made a huge contribution, the name **Friedrich Wilhelm von Steuben** comes to mind. Since I was familiar with the name but not a lot of the history, I consulted the Internet. Friedrich Wilhelm was born on September 17, 1730, in Magdeburg, Duchy of Magdeburg, Kingdom of Prussia, Holy Roman Empire. He was the son of Royal Prussian Engineer Capt. Baron Wilhelm von Steuben and his wife Elizabeth von Jagvodin. He was both a Prussian and later an American military leader.


Von Steuben served as Inspector General and Major General of the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. When he viewed the troops, he found that they were lacking the skills needed to fight the enemy effectively. He is credited with teaching the essentials of military drills, tactics, and discipline. When George Washington appointed him temporary Inspector General, he met with the troops and found that there was no order or standard for the layout of the encampment, and no standards for sanitation. He established rules that were followed for one and a half centuries.

When Congress appointed von Steuben Inspector General, he noted that the internal administration had been neglected, and no books were kept for supplies, clothing, or men, thus allowing for thievery. He enforced strict recordkeeping, which resulted in considerable savings to the Army. He also drafted a progressive training program for the soldiers, which included musket and bayonet training. This strict training resulted in the Revolutionary soldiers winning many battles and was a large reason why Americans won their independence. Von Steuben wrote *Regulations for the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States*, known as "the blue book." This was used by the U.S. Army until 1814, and it affected drills and tactics until the Mexican-American War of 1846.

Von Steuben became a U.S. citizen by act of the Pennsylvania legislature in March 1784, and later by the New York authorities in 1786. After settling in Manhattan and New Jersey, he came to Upstate New York and settled on a small estate in Oneida County near the city of Rome. The land was granted to him for his military service. He lived there until he died on November 28, 1794. He was buried in a grove at what became Steuben Memorial State Historic Site.

In September many cities across the United States celebrate Von Steuben Day. Participants march, dance, wear German costumes, and play German music. Millions of people attend nationwide. The former men's singing society, the **Syracuse Deutschegesangverein** sang many times at the celebration that was held in Steuben, NY. The German-American Steuben Parade that is held annually in New York City is one of the largest parades in the city and is traditionally followed by an Oktoberfest in Central Park as well as celebrations in Yorkville, Manhattan, a German section of NYC. The Von Steuben Parade in Chicago was even featured in the film *Ferris Bueller's Day Off.*

There are several towns named after von Steuben, as well buildings including the Von Steuben Metropolitan High School in Chicago. There is a statue of von Steuben in Lafayette Square, just north of the White House, in Washington, DC. There have also been portrayals of



von Steuben in U.S. media, including the 1979 miniseries The Rebels, the 1984 miniseries George Washington, and others. Von Steuben was a large part of our American history and should be thanked for his contribution to our freedom today. Where would the U.S. Army and our country have been without his many contributions?
