

hile looking for something to write about this month that has to do with August in Germany, I found a very interesting article on the internet about a Peace Festival in Augsburg, Germany, which is celebrated each year on August 8.

Since 1950, the Peace Festival, also known as the "Augsburg High Peace Festival," which is only celebrated in Augsburg, has been Germany's only municipal public holiday. Augsburg is a city with Roman Catholic roots that once forbade its citizens the right to practice the Christian faith as Protestants.

Now the people of Augsburg, "the City of Peace," demonstrate every year that peace is possible when we set aside our differences and instead focus on what we all have in common. Immigrants from all over the world, with varying religious faiths and practices, make up nearly half of Augsburg's current population. Although the city had an

early history of religious persecution, today the entire city of Augsburg closes shop for the day on August 8 to participate in the city's continued historic peaceful coexistence based on the pursuit of religious freedom. The people of Augsburg extend the right of every individual to practice their faith freely during Augsburg's annual celebration of peace.

For a little history of this holiday, Augsburg was the hub for the growing political conflict left as a result of the Christian Reformation movement in Europe in the early sixteenth century. The Holy Roman Emperor Charles V outlawed the Lutheran church in 1521, but the Lutheran movement continued to flourish until 1529 when Charles declared that Catholicism was to be restored everywhere in Germany. German princes and estate owners loudly and publicly denounced the Emperor's decree. The term Protestant was derived from these protests. In 1531 the Emperor ordered all Lutherans to reunite with the Catholic church, causing increased defiance from the Protestants.

It was not until 1555 that peace was established between the Lutherans and Catholics with the Augsburg Declaration of Religious Freedom, which guaranteed Protestants the right to practice their faith in the city of Augsburg. But this only included Lutheran Protestants; others, such as Calvinists, would be allowed to move to other regions where their faith was more compatible with the beliefs of that region.

In 1629, 74 years after winning the legal right to practice their faith, Lutheran Protestants were again banned from practicing their faith in Augsburg. It was not until the Peace of Westphalia was signed in 1648 that the original 1555 Augsburg Declaration of Religious Freedom was reinstated and their religious freedom was granted.

Protestants organized the first Augsburg High Peace Festival in 1650 to commemorate and demonstrate their commitment to peaceful religious coexistence. Today the festival is an interreligious and intercultural celebration, preceded by a week of cultural events leading up to the holiday on August 8.

Seems like in these trying times, we might all learn from Augsburg's journey of tolerance and acceptance of others and their varied religious beliefs and cultural practices.
