Now, moving on, I thought I would resurrect the article that I used in the past regarding *Fasching*.

Fasching is Germany's Biggest Bash!

Most people would probably say that the Munich Oktoberfest is the biggest bash in Germany. However, the greatest fest is none other than *Fasching* or *Fastnacht*, Germany's Mardi Gras. This is often referred to as Germany's foolish or silly season. There are thousands of costume balls and dances all over Germany. All events start at 11 minutes past the 11th hour on November 11. Although it remains low key for the first few weeks, the action really gets started 7 weeks before Easter.

The Thursday before Ash Wednesday is known as *Welber-fastnacht* or Women's Carnival Night. On this day, the women dress up like old ladies and go door to door pulling jokes on people, especially politicians. (Way to go girls!!!) The women are allowed to cut off the tie or kiss (or both) any man within their reach! My son happened to be going to Germany one year during *Fasching*, and he was advised to remove his tie before he exited the plane or one of he ladies would take care of it! During *Fasching* it is also tradition in many areas for the women to capture the local *Rathaus* (city hall) and take over the city key. The following Monday is known as *Rosenmontag* (Rose Monday). During this day there are parades and carnival floats. *Faschingdienstag* (Carnival Tuesday) is the last day of *Fasching*, when most of the festivities happen. Usually workers get the afternoon off to celebrate.

In Munich from 2 to 5 P.M. on *Faschingdienstag* the *Viktualienmarkt* pedestrian area is turned into a party zone. At night there are gala balls, the biggest held at the *Bayerischer Hof.* The Bavarians refer to *Fasching* as the "season of fools." Some people dress in costumes and ski down hills. It is a great time of the year to be able to dress up in costumes, act like a fool, have a great time, and nobody cares! (I think I would really like that!)

Munich also features donuts (*Fastnachts*) during *Fasching*. They can be found everywhere! (See a recipe for *Fastnachts* at the end of this article). The story goes that in pre-Christian Europe it was customary to choose a man to be the "sacred king" of the tribe for a year. When his year in office was up he would be sacrificed and his blood returned to the soil to ensure a successful harvest. The method of choosing the sacred king was the "king's cake." A coin or bean would be placed in the cake before baking and whoever got the slice with the coin was the chosen one. (I think that would have been a good time to go on a diet of no cake!) In recent times, the king's cake idea has evolved into donuts. Thank God, as I don't think we would want to sacrifice any kings around here!

Below is a recipe for *Fastnachts* (German donuts) usually made on Shrove Tuesday to use up the lard before Lent.

1 cup lukewarm milk
1 fresh yeast cake
34 cup soft butter
2 tablespoons sugar
6 eggs
6 cups flour
2 teaspoons salt

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm milk and set aside. Sift flour and salt into a large bowl. Make a hole in the center and pour the dissolved yeast and all other ingredients into the hole. Mix till no longer sticky. Cover and let rise in a warm place till doubled. Punch down and let rest for 10 minutes. Roll out about ¼-inch thick and cut out the donuts with a round cutter (not usually the regular donut cutter with the hole in the middle). Let the donuts rise for about 20 to 30 minutes. Fry in deep fat till light brown. Drain on paper towels, then while hot, roll in sugar. Enjoy!
